ir Lenny Henry is an actor, comedian and campaigner. He became the Chancellor of Birmingham City University in July 2016.



Since then, he has enjoyed an extensive career in film, TV and theatre. In recent years, Sir Lenny has enjoyed widespread acclaim for more dramatic roles, including playing the title role in a stage production of Shakespeare's 'Othello'.

In 2015, made a Sir in the Queen's 2015 Birthday Honours List for services to drama and charity. He was then presented with a special BAFTA award in 2016, in recognition of his outstanding contribution to television.

In academia, Sir Lenny became a Doctor of Philosophy in 2018, for his research investigating the role of black people in the media. In 2020 Sir Lenny was made a visiting Professor of Media Diversity at Birmingham City University.

NELSON MANDELA

1918 - 2013

elson Mandela influenced great change in South Africa that resonated around the world. He was a pioneer in ending white minority rule and fostering post-apartheid reconciliation in the early 1990s. In 1994, he became South Africa's first democratically-elected president and its first black leader. Before becoming president, Mandela was imprisoned for 27 years. He was jailed for standing up to the human rights abuses committed by the apartheid government against black South Africans.

MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR

1929 - 1968

n African American Baptist minister and activist who became the most visible spokesperson and leader in the Civil Rights Movement in the USA

Martin Luther King Jr. was an American Baptist minister and activist, one of the most prominent leaders in the civil rights movement from 1955 until his assassination in 1968. An African American church leader and the son of early civil rights activist and minister Martin Luther King Sr., King advanced civil rights for people of colour in the United States through nonviolence and civil disobedience. Inspired by his Christian beliefs and the nonviolent activism of Mahatma Gandhi, he led targeted, nonviolent resistance against Jim Crow laws and other forms of discrimination.

Through his leadership, the civil rights movement opened doors to education and employment that had long been closed to black America.

OLAUDAH EQUIANO

c1745 - 1797

orn in the Kingdom of Benin (modern southern Nigeria), Olaudah Equiano was forced into slavery as a young child. His first master, a Royal Navy officer renamed him 'Gustavus Vassa' and during their eight years together, Equiano learnt to read and write. After being traded two more times, Equiano had saved enough to finally buy his freedom. He then spent his life campaigning for the abolition of slavery, becoming a member of the Sons of Africa abolitionist group and publishing his autobiography, 'The Interesting Narrative of the Life of Olaudah Equiano, Or Gustavus Vassa, The African', published in 1789, which depicted the horrors of slavery. The book became a best-seller, aiding the abolitionist cause.






hen Barack Obama was elected US president in 2008, he became the first African American to hold the office, he served as the 44th president from 2009 to 2017.

As an incoming president, Obama faced many challenges—an economic collapse, wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, and the continuing menace of terrorism. Inaugurated before an estimated crowd of 1.8 million people, Obama proposed unprecedented federal spending to revive the economy and also hoped to renew America's stature in the world. During his first term he signed three signature bills: an omnibus bill to stimulate the economy, legislation making health care more accessible and affordable, and legislation reforming the nation's financial institutions. Obama also pressed for a fair pay act for women, financial reform legislation, and efforts for consumer protection.

In 2009, Obama became the fourth president to receive the Nobel Peace Prize.

ROSA PARKS

1913 - 2005

osa Louise McCauley Parks was an American activist in the civil rights movement best known for her pivotal role in the Montgomery Bus Boycott in America.

Rosa Louise Parks is internationally recognised as the "mother of the modern day civil rights movement" in America. Her refusal to surrender her seat to a white male passenger on a Montgomery, Alabama bus, December 1, 1955, triggered a wave of protest on December 5, 1955, that reverberated throughout the United States. Her quiet courageous act changed America, its view of black people and redirected the course of history.

As a role model for youth she was stimulated by their enthusiasm to learn as much about her life as possible. A modest person, she always encourages them to research the lives of other contributors to world peace. The Institute and The Rosa Parks Legacy are her legacies to people of good will.

In September 1996 President Clinton, the forty second President of the United States of America gave Mrs. Parks the MEDAL OF FREEDOM, the highest award given to a civilian citizen.

A quiet exemplification of courage, dignity, and determination; Rosa Parks was a symbol to all to remain free.

IGNATIUS SANCHO

c1729 - 1780

orn aboard a slave ship in the Atlantic Ocean, Sancho would arrive on British in bondage. Sancho was an avid reader with a thirst for knowledge and during his lifetime he composed music and wrote a large number of letters - the latter were published two years after his death making him the first African prose writer to have work published in England. After gaining financial independent householder status, Sancho became eligible to vote in 1774, becoming the first Briton of African heritage to vote in parliamentary elections. To many, Sancho was a symbol of the humanity of Africans and the immorality of the slave trade.

he son of a freed slave, William Cuffay became involved in politics when he was fired from his job as a tailor after taking part in the Tailors' Strike of 1834. Convinced that workers needed representation in Parliament, he became a leading figure in the Chartist movement, the first mass popular political movement in Britain. He was transported to Tasmania for allegedly planning an uprising against the British government. Despite a pardon three years later, Cuffay stayed in Tasmania and played an active role in politics there until he died in poverty in 1870.

orn in 1974 of Ghanian heritage her powerful activism for LGTB rights has been significant in the UK.

After studying at Bullsmoor School in Lea Valley it is here she became "politically active" and became active in equality.

In 2005 she co-founded the annual UK Black Pride event which has gone on to become a staple of the LGTBQ+ calendar. It was a telling move in reaction to what she states was "10/11 years, the pain I have felt at being rejected by the wider, mainly white gay LGBT+ community, who didn't and don't see their privilege whilst blocking Black Pride for wanting to be visible". In turn she was also appointed Grand Marshall of New York Pride in 2019. She is also the editor of Sista an anthology of writings by LGBT women

In 2016 she was offered an MBE for her work specifically at raising the awareness of blacks within the LGTBQ+ community. Unsurprisingly (perhaps) she rejected the MBE to protest against Britain's role in formulating anti LGTBQ+ penal codes across its Empire.

Since 2019 Lady Phyll has been Executive Director of Kaleidoscope aimed at fighting for the rights of LGBT+.

orris would live for just 27 years but would achieve more in her short life than many do in an entire lifetime. She cofounded the Brixton Black Women's Group, one of this country's first networks for black women, as well as being a founding member of the Organisation of Women of Asian and African Descent (OWAAD). Fighting for racial, gender and social equality in the late 1960s and throughout the following decade, Olive Morris made her mark in Britain before passing away of non-Hodgkin lymphoma.

BOUKAYO SAKA

oukayo Saka is a successful English footballer who also plays for England and Arsenal.

He is perhaps more well-known however for having missed a penalty for England in the finals of 2020 Euros

As a 19 year, old at the time he received a torrent of racial abuse after the match, however, fans rallied around him and he was applauded by fans even from rival teams at matches later on.

He will now represent England at the 2022 World Cup in Qatar

WILLIAM WILLBERFORCE

1759 - 1833

ilberforce is remembered as a leader of the abolition campaign in British history.

William Wilberforce was a deeply religious English member of parliament and social reformer who was very influential in the abolition of the slave trade and eventually slavery itself in the British empire.

"So enormous, so dreadful, so irremediable did the [slave] trade's wickedness appear that my own mind was completely made up for abolition. Let the consequences be what they would: I from this time determined that I would never rest until I had effected its shelltion."

An evangelical Christian and social reformer, Wilberforce dedicated himself to the 'suppression of the Slave Trade and the reformation of manners'. He entered Parliament in 1780 as a Tory MP and was the Parliamentary leader of the Abolition movement from 1787. After years of campaigning, Wilberforce's bill to end Britain's part in slave trading was passed to a standing ovation in 1807. A further act of 1833 provided for the emancipation of slaves in British colonies.

orn in Kenya in 1979, Vanessa Kingori initially studied in the Caribbean island of St Kitts.

She then moved to London where she completed her studying at the Royal Holloway College of the University of London where she studied BA Management and Sociology.

Since taking her first media related job at the Evening Standard, Vanessa has risen up the ranks seemingly having the Midas touch in whatever she turns her hands to.

She was appointed Publisher of British GQ across all platforms and in 2016 GQ saw its most successful year in over a decade. She was duly recognised-with an MBE

She gained further kudos receiving an award for the Media Mogul of the Year at the 2017 Black Magic Awards. And she was appointed Publishing Director of all British Vogue platforms the first female publishing director in its over 100-year history.

She led the #ShareTheMic UK campaign in 2020 to highlight the accomplishments and contribution of high achieving Black women. She also spearheads a fund to support women entrepreneurs in tech and business.

She reached the pinnacle of her industry in 2021 being appointed Chief Business Officer across the entire British company, covering all Conde Nast British brands-it is no mean feat.

Importantly through her work she has helped to forge the path for other women of black origins to aim high.

hile the church has always had a male dominated outlook Rose stated she found an overwhelming sense of "this is what I was called to do". With such an overwhelming calling it is perhaps not surprising that any barriers to achieving this calling were overcome.

Born in Montego Bay in 1961 she studied at the Montego Bay High School before embarking at the age of 14 into the ministry.

She came to the UK in 1982, to initially train at the Church Army college in the West Midlands. She then trained at the West Midlands Ministerial Training Course becoming a deacon in the Church of England at Petertide 1991.

Over the years she has steadily taken on different roles increasing the respect and kudos given to her by peers and others alike.

She was the Chaplain To The Speaker of the House Of Commons in 2019 and vicar at Westminster Abbey. Significantly she became the first black woman to be the Chaplain to the late Queen and in 2019 she also became the first black women to become a Church of England Bishop.

She was appointed Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in the 2020 New Year Honours for "services to young people and the Church"

oateng was born in the Muswell Hill on 28th February 1967, to Ghanaian parents.

When he was 14, he found a summer job sewing linings into suits. While studying computer science at Southgate College at the age of 16, he was introduced to cutting and designing by his girlfriend.

Using his mother's old sewing machine, he started designing and selling to his fellow students, and switched to graduate in fashion and design. He helped a friend to make clothes for a fashion show after receiving praise for his work, he sold his first collection to a menswear shop in Covent Garden.

Some of his first pieces were also sold in Academy on Newburgh Street in 1987. This enabled him to open his first studio in Portobello Road in 1991.

In 1994, he staged his first catwalk presentation during Paris Fashion Week, becoming the first tailor to stage a catwalk show in Paris. The Paris show in 1994 enabled Boateng to open his boutique on Vigo Street, the south end of Savile Row, in 1995. As of November 2019 it remains the only Black-owned store on Savile Row

Synonymous with high end fashion Oswald has gone on to be the by word for class attracting A listers from all over the world. Further than that from 1995 on he has worked with some of the biggest names from Givenchy to Virgin (2004) and British Airways (2018) who both asked him to design their uniform.

orn in South-East London to Jamaican parents, Martin is a Consultant Vascular and Trauma Surgeon at Barts Health NHS Trust, where he is also the Lead for Trauma Surgery, Educational Lead for Surgery, and the Trauma Network lead for violence reduction.

Martin has lived and worked in London the majority of his life, training at the Medical School of St Bartholomew's Hospital where he graduated with a distinction in surgery. He teaches undergraduate medical students at Barts Medical School and Brighton and Sussex Medical School and teaches on the faculty of numerous courses at the Royal College of Surgeons.

Martin has been a passionate advocate of diversity and equality having worked in the community to promote this for over 15 years. He was recently appointed as the first ambassador to the Mary Seacole Trust. This charity celebrates the life and achievements of Mary Seacole, a Jamaican born nurse who treated troops in the Crimean war. It promotes her as a role model, tackling social challenges and inequality with a focus on youth engagement and the promotion of good citizenship.

Martin was awarded the Hero Doctor award at this year's NHS Heroes Awards, named by the Evening Standard as one of the 1,000 most influential Londoners.

His most important work coming in the face of what many are calling a knife epidemic. As a Trauma Consultant he has seen the devastation knife crime can cause. He was appointed the Clinical Director for Violence Reduction to help prevent stabbings and other violent crime.

He was awarded the CBE in 2021.

orn to Nigerian parents on the 9th March 1968 in Camden Maggie has become a powerhouse within the scientific world.

Despite suffering with dyslexia she was academically very gifted. She studied at La Sainte Union Convent School in North London. She gained four A-Levels in Maths, Physics, Chemistry, and Biology before going to Imperial College gaining a BSC in Physics (1990) followed by her PHD in Mechanical Engineering.

Perhaps more than many her achievements in the scientific world

are huge considering the potential barriers to success due to her gender and race. Indeed Maggie recounts that when she said to a teacher, she wanted to be an astronaut she was told to do nursing as that was scientific too.

Regardless of those potential barriers Margaret has used her science background to rise up through the scientific world on merit to be a highly respected scientist.

Through that respect she has been awarded a multitude of scientific awards and Honorary Doctorates. She was awarded an MBE in 2009 for Services to Science and Science Education, 2013 Yale University

Centre for Dyslexia "Out of the box thinking award, 2014 Honorary Doctor of Science, University of Bath and more recently, 2020 Institute of Physics Lord Kelvin Medal for her public engagement in physics.

Of course fame has now landed at her door presenting programmes on TV but perhaps the most prestigious is the presenter of the Sky At Night. The show an institution in its own right presented for many decades by the indomitable Patrick Moore.

Maggie has succeeded in that endeavour, and she is a staple of the UK scientific world.

t still only 24, Marcus
Rashford has bucked
the stereotypical view of
footballers and achieved an immense
amount for his club, the England team,

Born in Manchester in 1997 he grew up with his four older siblings. He attended Ashton-on-Mersey School, where he studied for a Business and Technology Education Council (BTEC) National Diploma in Sport.

He made his international debut for the England in 2016 starting in a warm-up game against Australia. He scored a goal just after the 3 minutes from the start which eventually led to a 2-1 victory.

At the age of 18, he became the youngest English footballer to represent the team in any European championships beating the record which was previously held by Wayne Rooney.

His outside influences out of football are however what set him apart with his charity exploits and his philanthropic endeavours.

October 2019, Rashford set up the In the Box campaign with Selfridges to give homeless people essential items over the Christmas period and was a vocal voice against the governments plans to stop free school meals. Rashford wrote an open letter to the UK government calling on them to end UK child poverty. A day later, the government announced a change in policy regarding the extension of free school meals for children during the summer holidays. 1 September, in an attempt to tackle child food poverty, Rashford announced that he had set up the Child Food Poverty Task Force in collaboration with several UK food shops, manufacturers, charities and delivery companies. He was awarded the MBE and Campaigner Of The Year by GQ 2020.

Lynette has been one of the UK's most successful black artists for well over a decade with beautiful paintings like; The Generosity (2010), Trapsrung (2013) and Leave A Brick Under The Maple (2015), a life-size portrait of a standing man which sold for nearly \$1 million

It is no wonder that she has subsequently been awarded prestigious accolades and awards from shortlisting for the Turner Prize (2013) to winning the prestigious Carnegie International Award (57th Edition) in 2019

Ultimately Lynette is clearly a creative and so her occasional forays into the written word are not that surprising. She often uses short stories and prose to accompany her artwork but has also said of herself "writes the things she doesn't paint and paints all the things she doesn't write".

arvin Rees was first elected mayor in May 2016. On that day, Bristol became the first major European city to have elected a mayor of black African heritage.

Marvin Rees was born on the brought up in Bristol, partly in Lawrence Weston and Easton, by his British mother.

He obtained a master's degree in Political Theory and Government at the University of Wales in and a master's degree in Global Economic Development at Eastern University in 2000. Later he completed the World Fellows Program at Yale University.

Rees is the founder and programme lead at the Bristol Leadership Programme, a two-week programme that helps a dozen people annually from impoverished backgrounds to attain what they aspire to.

Since 2016 Reeves has been the mayor to the buzzing and vibrant city of Bristol.

atrick Roach born in April 1964 to Jamaican parents was brought up in Walsall. It was a trying and testing time and Roach admits growing up in Walsall with racial tensions at a high "wasn't a walk in the park".

Roach attended comprehensive schools and he hoped to become a schoolteacher but did not secure the grades to attend university, so went to Matthew Boulton College obtaining higher grades, he was able to study education at the University of Leicester, before becoming a teacher in colleges of further education. He taught Politics and Sociology and lectured on social policy issues in universities, before working on a range of programmes focusing on teacher education, disaffected, and excluded young people and engaging parents and local communities.

He has a PhD in sociology.

In 2017, Dr Roach penned a response to the government's Racial Disparity Audit, in which he said that "racial disadvantage and discrimination is widespread within our school system".

In 2020, he became the National Association of Schoolmasters/Union of Women Teachers (NAS/UWT) general secretary.

yuba Suleiman Diallo was an educated man from a family of Muslim clerics in West Africa. In 1731 he was taken into slavery and sent to work on a plantation in America. By his own enterprise, and assisted by a series of spectacular strokes of fortune, Diallo arrived in London in 1733. Recognised as a deeply pious and educated man, in England Diallo mixed with high and intellectual society, was introduced at Court and was bought out of slavery by public subscription. In the early years of the nineteenthcentury, advocates of the abolition of slavery would cite Diallo as a key figure in asserting the moral rights and humanity of black people. He was one of the few victims of the transatlantic slave trade who, as a freed slave, was able to return home to his family in Africa.



presenter and wheelchair basketball
player. As a presenter, he has hosted
a range of travel documentaries
and sports programmes for BBC
television. Adepitan is an awardwinning disability advocate and one of
the first physically disabled television
presenters in the UK, with a career
that spans 21 years.

Ade was initially a healthy child with no disabilities. However at the age of 15 months he caught polio resulting in the loss of movement in both of his legs.

As Ade has shown, his 'disability' has been far from a hinderance. He has gone on to achieve more than most people can say in their short lives as a wheelchair basketball champ.

Achieving much in his basketball career he went on to compete for Team GB at Paralympic, European and World Championship levels winning bronze medal at the (2004) Summer Paralympics in Athens and the gold medal at the (2005) Paralympic World Cup in Manchester.

As an ambassador and mentor, he again works tirelessly being a patron of Go Kids Go, a supporter of the National Society for the Prevention of the Cruelty to Children Charity (NSPCC), the WheelPower Charity and the first Ambassador for Every Parent and Child (EPC).
