

Request:

Question 1: Bedfordshire and Luton countywide service

Question 3 (of DA5123) - Could you please ask the Bedfordshire and Luton countywide service to detail the maximum intensity of treatment that the 'home intensive treatment option' is able to provide in terms of the number of contacts per week and their duration?

(The purpose of question 3 is to gauge the maximum intensity of treatment that such programmes are able to provide/their capacity to provide alternatives to inpatient admission. We are looking at this nationally to see how many areas are currently able to provide genuinely intensive levels of community and/or day patient treatment (without naming providers). To be able to do this we need detailed information about the programmes that are in place, as set out in the prompts/subsections of this question).

Answer:

What is the maximum intensity of treatment (in terms of frequency and duration of contacts per week, and number of meals supported) that can be provided by these services?

Bedfordshire Adults – Operates five days per week (Monday – Friday); two meals and two snacks per day. The contacts are ten per week as a minimum in the first eight weeks including two carers support contacts. 50% must be face to face and the number of contacts is tapered in weeks eight to twelve.

Bedfordshire Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS) - The intensive service currently operates Monday – Friday. There is currently no set maximum number of contacts, the number is adapted to each individual case and their needs. The input is reviewed weekly; however the initial plan will support ideally up to six weeks, though there is room for extending this if needed.

Depending on the individual's need, they will receive daily input and support for at least one meal a day (more if required – up to three maximum a day, however this would be time limited) and this will gradually reduce over time as initial crisis begins to reduce.

What is the maximum intensity of treatment (in terms of frequency and duration of contacts per week, and number of meals supported) that can be provided by these services?

Answer:

East London CAMHS – This response relates to the intensive outpatient programme for eating disorders that is run by East London Community Eating Disorders Service for Children and Young People (CEDS-CYP) team.

EDIP runs for a maximum of eight weeks.

The maximum contact is eleven YP/parent sessions a week plus a weekly professionals Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) meeting (twelve sessions a week). The duration is variable depending on the session format, e.g. psychiatry, dietetic, nursing, therapy, key work or meal support, but on average will be approximately an hour each. The maximum meal support that can be offered is eight per week, but this would be in exceptional circumstances and time-limited to two weeks. The usual maximum meal support offer within the programme is four per week.

Additionally, there are three YP/parents/professionals meetings organised at the start of EDIP, at the mid-point and at the end, which last an hour each.

This does not include any necessary administrative time and liaisons with other professionals, relative to each case.

For East London wide service for City & Hackney, Newham and Tower Hamlets:

As minimum, the young person and their family are invited to an initial goal setting meeting, a mid-point review and an end-of-programme review with the MDT.

In terms of enhanced support as minimum, five contacts per week (x3 meal support sessions + key working session + therapy [core team]) are offered. On top of these there are nursing, psychiatry, and dietetic sessions, as needed.
