Jessica Catchpole


Lived Experience Researcher, PEGASUS project

NIHR Academic Clinical Fellow, Core Psychiatry Trainee (CT1)
Queen Mary, University of London and East London NHS Foundation Trust

Sam studied pre-clinical medicine at Oxford University and intercalated with a BA in neuroscience. He then moved to UCL for his clinical studies, where he enrolled in the MB-PhD programme. In 2019 he completed his PhD at the Max Planck UCL Centre for Computational Psychiatry and Ageing Research. During his PhD he used quantitative methods in neuroimaging and behavioural modelling to investigate how the brain distinguishes between Self and Other, both in the general population and in people with borderline personality disorder. Sam completed his academic foundation training at Barts Health NHS Trust, working on a project to develop an fMRI-based predictive biomarker for dementia patients. As an Academic Clinical Fellow at QMUL he is now combining his interests in social cognition and dementia to build on these earlier projects.

Afia holds several active NIHR grants. She is the Chief Investigator of the ICONIC study, which aims to adapt and evaluate DIALOG+, a solution-focused intervention designed to improve quality of life for people with learning disabilities. She is also Co-chief investigator for the PETAL study, which aims to evaluate a personalised intervention for adults with learning disabilities who present and aggressive or challenging behaviours. She is also Co-chief investigator for the OptiCat, which assess Care, Education, and Treatments reviews (CETRs) for people with learning disabilities and autistic individuals.

Paul Gilluley

Chief Medical Officer
NHS North East London Integrated Care Board

Paul qualified in Medicine from the University of Glasgow in 1991. He subsequently trained in psychiatry and was appointed Consultant Forensic Psychiatrist for Westminster in 2000.

Paul has worked in a number of clinical settings. He helped develop the Quality Network for Forensic Psychiatry at the Royal College of Psychiatry and went on to be specialist advisor in forensic mental health to the Care Quality Commission.

In 2012, he became Head of Forensic Services at East London NHS Foundation Trust, where in 2017 he became Chief Medical Officer. During the Covid-19 pandemic, Paul provided clinical leadership in the roll-out of the Covid-19 vaccine across North East London. In July 2022 he took up the post of Chief Medical Officer at NHS North East London Integrated Care Board.



Lynis Lewis

Service Director, R & D Noclor

Lynis has been working in the field of healthcare research for over 25 years and has been the Service Director of Noclor for almost two decades. Over that time, she has led the development of Noclor into the largest non-acute research office in the country, partnering with mental health trusts, primary care, and non-NHS organisations across North London. She has been a constant champion of research in these settings and a challenger to traditional views of their research capabilities.

Lynis was appointed as the first Director of Research for the new North London NHS Foundation Trust and has co-led on shaping an ambitious strategy for mental health research across the area with the UCL Institute of Mental Health. In 2024, she received the Lifetime Achievement Award at the NIHR North Thames CRN Research Awards, recognising her outstanding contribution to advancing research and fostering collaboration across sectors. She is part of the leadership team for UKRD, which brings R&D leaders together to be powerful influencers of change. This role places her in a pivotal position to drive policy in mental health research and research in wider care settings on a national scale.

Frank Röhricht

Medical Director for Research, Innovation and Medical Education, East London NHS Foundation Trust Clinical Professor of Psychiatry, Queen Mary University of London

Frank started his career in Psychiatry as a Community Support Worker in a psychiatric day centre for patients with chronic mental illness in Hagen, Germany, subsequently working part-time as psychiatric nurse assistant in an acute psychiatric hospital. Frank trained in Integrative Body Psychotherapy in the Netherlands. He studied Medicine in Germany, obtained his Medical Qualification (State Exam, MBBS equivalent in Berlin) and completed his M.D. at Free University Berlin/Germany, (Doctor of Medicine by Thesis): "Body concept and body schema and their relationship with psychopathological symptoms within acute paranoid schizophrenia".


Frank undertook specialist Training in Psychiatry, Neurology and Psychosomatic Medicine. Since 1997, Frank worked as a Consultant Psychiatrist at Newham Community NHS Trust / East London & the City University Mental Health NHS Trust (now East London NHS Foundation Trust). From 2000-2013, Frank was Clinical Director for Adult Mental Health services in Newham, and since 2018, he is Medical Director for Research, Innovation and Medical Education.

He is Honorary Professor of Psychiatry at Wolfson Institute for Population Health, Queen Mary University of London and Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Nicosia, Cyprus; from 2020-2023 he was ELFT Director on a Masters Programme in Body Psychotherapy at Maltepe University in Istanbul, Turkey.

Liz Sampson

Professor of Liaison Psychiatry Queen Mary, University of London

Liz is an inaugural chair in the Queen Mary University of London and Bart's Health Academic Centre for Healthy Ageing (ACHA), leading on mental health, dementia and delirium. She is a liaison psychiatrist for ELFT at the Royal London Hospital. Her research focuses on the complex interfaces between physical and mental health, particularly in older adults and those who are frail, clinical studies of delirium and how this translates into policy influence. She studied medicine at the University of Birmingham and gained her MD from the UCL Institute of Neurology. Liz is President Elect of the European Delirium Association and Research Lead for the UK Faculty of Liaison Psychiatry Executive Committee.
